Imagine that you need to convince a group of community leaders how dangerous even modern pesticides still are: though DDT has been banned, the city is considering heavily spraying another, legal chemical—both in rural and residential areas--to eradicate a voracious insect species that has been damaging citrus trees. As part of your case, you are allowed to give the committee just one of the two texts: Carson's or Boyle's. Which would you choose? Why? Keep in mind the genre, style, focus, and humor (or lack thereof) of each text. The thesis needs to mention both works.
